Candle Lighting Ceremony – 2010/2011

The candle lighting ceremony is effective indoors or out of doors at the close of the Grange year. In many Granges, it is used on the first meeting of the new year, since it impresses upon the participants the ideals for which those engaged in Grange work should stand.

A lighted candle, partially burned, should be placed on the Overseer's station prior to starting the candle lighting ceremony. Small unlit candles are needed for all Grange members present at the meeting.

Simplicity is the keynote of this service. Silence—absolute and complete silence—on the part of the audience is imperative! This can be obtained by explaining to the group in advance and by setting a good example.

Much of the success of a candle lighting service depends on the choice of persons to take speaking parts. All persons should speak distinctly and loudly enough to be heard. They should try to put the feeling of a "sacred trust" into their voices as they speak their parts, which must be memorized perfectly.

If we were asked to express what Grange work means to us, each of us would tell a different story, and many of us would find great difficulty putting into words all that would need saying. This is often true of the things that mean a great deal to us. When words seem inadequate, we symbolize as beautifully as we can what we want to express. It is such a symbolic description of the meaning of Grange work that we are now about to present.

The Grange was organized in 1867. Our beliefs and principles have lasted through thick and thin, through war and peace, in rural farmland and in metropolitan cities.

We now light the candle symbolizing the lessons learned in our Grange degrees. The lessons kindle high desires. Let us hear the meaning of those lessons.

The lesson of the first degree is FAITH.

We learned faith in the early spring. We placed faith in God that our crops would grow and produce. We also must place faith in the abilities of our Grange brothers and sisters that we can depend upon each other through our Grange work to make our communities a better place to live. We have no substitute for planning, organizing, and being prepared.

The lesson of the second degree is HOPE.

Lights candle from lecturer's candle and returns to place.

Hope teaches us to have faith in our knowledge and skills and Grange members. May the seeds we planted while planning and organizing our year's activities come to fruition and be received with open arms throughout our Granges and communities.

The lesson of the third degree is CHARITY.

Lights candle from lecturer's candle and returns to place.

The lesson of the fourth degree is FIDELITY.

Lights candle from lecturer's candle and returns to place.

It is in our communities that we enjoy the fruits of our labors in the Grange. We must celebrate our work as Grange brothers and sisters both in and out of the Grange. Our labors have made the Grange stronger and our communities will be a reflection of our stronger organization.

While we sing **Abide With Me** (*or some other appropriate song*), let each of us light anew the flame of his Grange ideal.
